AHSN COLLOQUIUM 2014 SUCCESS!

The AHSN Colloquium came and went last month! It was a whirl-wind of good research and good humour. 45 multi-disciplinary papers were presented, with more than fifty participants attending. The program was the longest yet staged by AHSN, running for 2 1/2 days at the National Library of New Zealand (Te Puna Matauranga o Aotearoa).

Keynote and invited speakers included a special session on cartooning hosted by the NCA, a paper by Dr Moira Marsh (Folklore Librarian, Indiana University) on the cross-cultural topic of practical joking, and Ian F. Grant (Founder and President, NCA), on how cartoons have reflected Australia-New Zealand relations since the 1890s.

Most exciting of all? Our wonderful graduate students! 17 research students from 8 universities in Australia, New Zealand and Asia presented a total of 13 papers.

- Creative works; Writing, images, sounds, or mixed media.

Submissions should be limited to three pieces. All submissions should be sent as an email attachment in a PC-readable format to philament.usyd@gmail.com together with a submission form available from arts.usyd.edu.au/publications/philament/submissions.htm

Academic papers must include endnotes and conform to the *Philament* house style of referencing as detailed at the URL above. *Philament* will only accept submissions not previously published and not under consideration elsewhere.

POSTGRAD HIGHLIGHT

In a new feature on exciting postgraduate research, The Digest profiles Khin Wee Chen and his work on political memes and digital visual satire.

Khin Wee Chen is a PhD candidate at the Media and Communications Department of the University of Canterbury, New Zealand. His paper "Mediascape Mapping: An Ordered Approach for Identifying Areas in a Socio-political Humour Site in Singapore for Further Study" was recently presented at the 2014 Colloquium.

Your Eds asked Khin Wee to tell us a little more about his doctoral research.

"My research argues that political memes have emerged as a remediated form of political editorial cartoon, and are carrying out many of the functions of the traditional cartoons, and more.

After half a century of domination under the same political regimes respectively in Malaysia and Singapore, these two societies are undergoing a period of significant struggle for change. A democratising effect has been observed in how ordinary citizens use online memes to voice their dissent in these two largely authoritarian societies.

My study, using digital ethnography, compares the whys and hows of the usage of political humour, especially digital visual satire, in these two countries."



Your classy Ed attempts to eat her DVD box set of *The Thick of It*.


