Looking Ahead to February 2025 AHSN2025 Call for Papers

The 31st AHSN Conference will take place in-person from 19-21 February 2025 at Flinders University, Adelaide (in the new CBD campus). The Conference will begin early afternoon on Wednesday 19 February, enabling delegates from Aotearoa/New Zealand and Interstate to travel to Adelaide that morning if they wish.

The conference theme will be 'The Evolutions of Humour'. Humour is a dynamic set of practices, capable of adapting to shifting cultural norms and new methods of delivery. AHSN2025 invites presentations on the various evolutions of humour. Where has humour come from and where it is going? What aspects of humour remain stable and what have changed forever?

Presentations addressing any aspect of the changing forms of humour are especially welcomed for this conference. As in previous AHSN conferences, however, papers are welcome on any and all aspects of social laughter and humour, and from diverse disciplinary perspectives including not only humour studies as such, but also literary studies, linguistics, cultural studies, politics, psychology, biology and physiology, philosophy, history, comedy studies, law, creative practices, sociology, communication studies and others.

Please note that next year's AHSN conference will be preceded on the Monday and Tuesday by an **International Round-Table on the Study of Political Cartoons**, hosted by the ARC-funded Cartoon Nation project. Abstracts should be around 250-300 words in length. Please add a presentation title above the abstract. Members of the AHSN Review Panel will check and review all submissions. They may recommend changes and revisions to presenters. All accepted conference abstracts will be published on the AHSN website and in the booklet of abstracts for the AHSN2025 conference. Student scholarships

AHSN awards up to five scholarships in the form of conference registration fee-waivers for research students enrolled for study primarily at Australian and Aotearoa/New Zealand universities. These are awarded on the basis of the best and first completed proposals, so please make sure to get your abstracts in early.

It is recommended that those planning to attend AHSN 2025 do book travel and accommodation as early as possible. The conference is deliberately designed to occur alongside the opening of Adelaide's Fringe Festival, allowing attendees to experience the city at its cultural best. While there will certainly be plenty of accommodation options available, your preferred location may be harder to book than usual, so early bookings are advised.

Unveiling the Serious Side of Humour in Online Safety: Insights from the 4th Annual AHSN Research Webinar

In the ever-evolving landscape of digital platforms, the line between humour and harm can often blur, presenting a complex challenge for online safety. This pertinent issue took centre stage at the recent 4th Annual AHSN Research Webinar, featuring Dr Ariadna Matamoros-Fernandez from QUT's Digital Media Research Centre and co-hosted by Dr Benjamin Nickl and Dr Beatriz Carbajal from The University of Sydney.

Under the compelling title, "Taking Humour Seriously for Online Safety", Dr Matamoros-Fernandez shared her research about the intricate dynamics of online humour and its potential to inflict harm. The webinar was not merely an exploration of comedic online content but a critical examination of its implications in the digital realm.

One of the primary hurdles discussed was the inherent difficulty in discerning the intent behind online humour. Dr Matamoros-Fernandez illuminated the multifaceted nature of this challenge, encompassing platform specificity, technological affordances, and the lack of contextual cues. This complexity is further compounded by the ambiguity surrounding what constitutes "illegal" versus "legal but harmful" content and activity.

The landscape of online safety regulations, as highlighted during the webinar, is undergoing significant transformation. Initiatives such as the UK's Online Safety Bill Draft, the EU's Digital Services Act, and Australia's Online Safety Bill are striving to address these pressing concerns. However, the central question persists: How can platforms effectively moderate humour in a manner that is both legitimate and respectful of freedom of expression?

Dr Matamoros-Fernandez shed light on the discrepancy between platform policies and international human rights standards for content moderation. While platforms often assert adherence to these standards, the practical application raises pertinent questions regarding legality, legitimacy, and proportionality in moderation measures.

The webinar culminated in a thought-provoking Q&A session, where attendees grappled with the complexities and implications of regulating online humour—most of all the question of what exactly constitutes harmful humour online. It became evident that achieving a balance between safeguarding users from harm and upholding fundamental rights poses a formidable challenge in the digital age.

As we navigate this intricate terrain, the insights gleaned from Dr Matamoros-Fernandez's research serve as a beacon, guiding policymakers, platform operators, and users alike toward a more nuanced understanding of humour's role in online safety.

In the wake of the 4th Annual AHSN Research Webinar, the imperative to take humour seriously in the digital realm has never been more pressing. By fostering dialogue, collaboration, and critical inquiry, we can strive towards a safer, more inclusive online environment for all.

It's worth noting that all this work is part of Dr Matamoros-Fernandez's current DECRA project 'Taking Humour Seriously for Online Safety'. She has published on this also in the context of humour-based controversies and is currently planning to work with colleagues in Europe to study the issues further: https://www.qut.edu.au/about/our-people/academic-profiles/ariadna.matamorosfernandez
